Ramanan Raghavendran named chair of Penn Board of Trustees

The University of Pennsylvania announced that Ramanan Raghavendran will become Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Pennsylvania effective immediately. Raghavendran succeeds Scott L. Bok, who served as Chair since July 2021, before stepping down in December 2023. Julie Beren Platt, who has been serving as Interim Chair, will return to her role as Vice Chair.

Raghavendran, a Penn alumnus, is the managing partner and co-founder of Amasia, a global venture capital firm focused on climate and sustainability.

J. Larry Jameson, MD, PhD, has agreed to serve as interim president of the University of Pennsylvania, effective immediately. Dr. Jameson has served as executive vice president of the University of Pennsylvania for the Health System and dean of the Raymond and Ruth Perelman School of Medicine, which together comprise Penn Medicine, since 2011. Jonathan A. Epstein, MD, executive vice dean and chief scientific officer of the Perelman School of Medicine and senior vice president and chief scientific officer of the University of Pennsylvania Health System, will step in as interim executive vice president for the Health System and dean of the Perelman School of Medicine.

Dr. Hans Binnendijk is a Distinguished Fellow at the Atlantic Council. Until recently he was also an Adjunct Political Scientist at the RAND Corporation and a Senior Fellow at the School of Advanced International Studies.

Until July 4, 2012, he was the Vice President for Research and Applied Learning at the National Defense University and Theodore Roosevelt Chair in National Security Policy. He served twice as Director of NDU's Institute for National Strategic Studies. From 2001 to 2009 he was the founding Director of NDU's Center for Technology and National Security Policy.

Penn Museum update on Heritage West: West Philadelphia Community Archaeology Project

Meg Kassebaum and The University Museum will provide an update on the Heritage West Project and the archeological dig at "Black Bottom" in West Philadelphia that is underway. And the crew includes eleven community members and ten Penn undergraduates, who have been working in four distinct excavation areas on the CEC's property. Michael E. Mann, Presidential Distinguished Professor, Director, Penn Center for Science, Sustainability & the Media, Department of Earth & Environmental Science/Annenberg School for Communication.

Dr. Mann is the author of several books including his most recent work, The New Climate War, which shows how fossil fuel companies have waged a thirty-year campaign to deflect blame and responsibility and delay action on climate change and offers a battle plan for how we can rescue the planet.

Professor Mann has contributed to the scientific understanding of historic climate change based on the temperature record of the past thousand years. Director of Resilience and Positive Psychology Training Programs and Director of Training Programs at the University of Pennsylvania Positive Psychology Center. She is the lead curriculum developer and instructor and trains and supervises all training instructors. She is an internationally recognized expert in the fields of resilience, depression prevention, and Positive Psychology.

She has more than 30 years of experience developing and delivering resilience and Positive Psychology programs for educators and their students, U.S. Army soldiers, health care professionals, a professional sports organization, corporate audiences, and more. As lead instructor of the Penn Resilience Program, she has worked with more than 10,000 participants.

Dr. Reivich's scholarly work focuses on helping parents, educators, and leaders to promote resilience and well-being. For 20 years, she was a Co-Principal Investigator of several research studies of the Penn Resilience Programs funded by the National Institute of Mental Health and the U.S. Department of Education. Dr. Reivich has published extensively in academic journals and edited books in the areas of Positive Psychology and resilience. Her scholarly publications have appeared in academic journals including Psychological Science, Journal of Early Adolescence, School Psychology Quarterly, Journal of Abnormal Child Psychology, and Journal of Consulting and Clinical Psychology. She is a co-author of two books: The Optimistic Child and The Resilience Factor.

A classmate's story: Marilyn Roderick, MD

Aloha Classmates Who Are Not Done Yet!

I want to take some of you on a journey you have never taken before, even the most well-traveled of you!

Elsie says I'm to tell my story, which is way too long. So I'll tell my "Current Story" after a quick introduction.

After graduating with a BS in Nursing, I worked on one of the last Contagious Diseases Floors in Boston. Eventually became one of the first Nurse Epidemiologists, then a Hospital Epidemiologist (though not a MD); after 10 years, I missed Patient Care so attended Stanford Medical School for 5 years until I achieved my MD in 1983. I published a book, Infection Control in Critical Care during my first year of Medical School. I then took a hybrid residency Internal Medicine and OB-GYN, then did a bit of everything when practicing in remote areas in Hawaii.

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
